## PROGRAM NOTES

This piece pairs the iconic melody of Gustav Holst's In the Bleak Midwinter with a lesser known, but equally beautiful, melody by Bruce Becker, originally set to the text of The Tree of Life. In this arrangement, the composer weaves both melodies together, and integrates Christina Rossetti's classic text with newly crafted lyrics which speak to the anticipation and meaning of Christmas.
