Praise the Lord with Drums and Cymbals is a festive arrangement for organ, brass quartet, timpani, and timpani, of a movement from *33 Portraits*, Op. 101, a collection of short pieces for harmonium (reed organ) by German composer and professor of theory Sigfrid Karg-Elert (1877–1933). While *Praise the Lord with Drums and Cymbals* is imitative of the musical style of Georg Frideric Handel, most of Karg-Elert's works may best be described as late romantic with touches of impressionism and expressionism.

Although Karg-Elert's music was not held in high regard and often neglected in his native country during his lifetime, it was well-received in England and the United States. His keyboard works include 66 Chorale Improvisations for Organ, Op. 65 (1906-1908); 20 Chorale Preludes and Postludes for Organ, Op. 78 (1912); 33 Portraits for Harmonium, Op. 101 (ca. 1924); and Cathedral Windows for Organ, Op. 106 (1923).

Reproducible parts for Trumpets I and II in B-flat and C, Horn in F (substitute for Trombone I), Trombones I and II, Cymbals, Timpani, and Organ are included in the back of this publication.
