## Program Notes

Christina G. Rossetti (1830-1894) began writing at age 7, but was 31 before her first work was published. She was hailed as the natural successor to Elizabeth Barrett Browning. A devout Anglo-Catholic, her popularity faded in the early 20th century from Modernism's backlash, but in the past few decades she has been rediscovered. Her visionary poetry has a deeply religious quality, and a keen sense of the spiritual world.

Easter Hymn sets three verses of Rossetti's poem Easter Morning, one of nearly a dozen poems she wrote about Easter. My setting strives to capture both the awe and joy of Christ's resurrection. The main musical motive is a rising scale. Interwoven into the composition is the Easter hymn "Gelobt sei Gott" by Melchior Vulpius (1570-1615) which is stated in the brass quartet between Rossetti's verses. This leads to the chorus taking up this music in the final "Alleluias."

Easter Hymn was commissioned by Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church, Jeffrey Brillhart, Director of Music and Fine Arts, in loving memory of Virginia Smith. The piece was premiered on Easter Sunday, April 12th, 2020.
