## **Program Notes**

A celebration of spring, *Spring Carol* is based on text by Robert Louis Stevenson. Perhaps best know as the author of *Treasure Island* and *Strange Cast of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde*, he was also a writer of short stories and poetry. From his 1918 publication *New Poems*, the following text was selected to capture the energetic buoyancy of spring.

A rousing melody set in compound duple meter; the music depicts the imagery of streamlets gushing, and the many sounds of rejoicing nature that accompany spring. A brief section in simple meter is excerpted from a *Spring Song* which denotes a scene of pastoral tranquility ("the air was full of sun and birds . . . and I knew love"). The piece finishes with the initial melody accompanied by a soaring descant.

Singing the song of the meadows.

When loud by landside streamlets gush,
And clear in the greenwood quires the thrush,
With sun on the meadows
And songs in the shadows
Comes again to me
The gift of the tongues of the lea,
The gift of the tongues of meadows.

It bears the song of the skylark down,
It hears the singing of the town;
Youth on the highways
And lovers in byways
Follows and sees:
And hearkens the song of the leas
And sings the songs of the highways.

The air was full of sun and birds. The fresh air sparkled clear. Remembrance wakened in my heart And I knew love.

So when the earth is alive with gods, The lusty ploughman breaks the sod, The grass singe in meadows, And flowers smile in shadows, Sits my heart at ease, Hearing the song of the leas, Singing the song of the meadows.
